CSLP Teen Video Challenge 2019

The Collaborative Summer Reading Program (CSLP) will be sponsoring the Teen Video Challenge (TVC) for 2019 but this year it will be a little different.

First, what will remain the same:

- The TVC invites teens to create and submit a PSA-type video promoting reading and library use to other teens.
- Each video needs to include the teen/teen team's interpretation of the 2019 CSLP slogan, "A Universe of Stories," to correspond to the 2019 space theme.
- Videos need to adhere to copyright law and be appropriate for all ages.

- Each of the 5 winning teens/teen teams will receive a \$200 cash prize and the winners' local public libraries will each receive a \$50 gift certificate from Upstart. Now, for the changes:
- Instead of state winners, there will be 5 national winners (this means that teens will submit videos directly to the national judging panel without having to go through me as the State Rep).
- The program will accept submissions June 1-Aug 2, 2019, so that the program can be incorporated into summer programs (it is still a great opportunity to partner with schools with video production classes or clubs; students can produce the videos as a class project and submit them in June!).
- · Videos will be up to 60 seconds long.
- Permission and model release forms will not be required until the finalists are selected, who will then need to supply the forms, completed correctly, to be able to win. The only form required upfront will be a simple online submission form.
- The TVC Ad-Hoc Committee will convene a judging panel from CSLP partners and members.
- Video uploads will not be limited to YouTube and Vimeo; rather, teens can upload their creations to the social media outlet of their choice.

These changes were crafted to make the contest simpler for you as teen services staff in public librarians to promote and administer, and simpler too for teens to enter. We hope these changes will boost interest and participation in the contest and make it more accessible for all involved. An overview of the TVC is--for the first time!--in the CSLP Teen Manual (pages 33-35) as well. Look for more information on the CSLP website in early 2019.

I want to highlight our final two webinars for the year:

- From Access to Advocacy: The Disability Community in the Library, with Bryce Kozla. This one was under-attended due to the snow day most of the state was experiencing that day. Fortunately, we have all of the materials archived for you -- slides, session recording, Bryce's digital handout (in the form of a Pinterest board), and her reflection blog post. I encourage everyone to explore this one; I think it could be game-changing for both front-line library staff and for administrators with regard to making libraries more accessible to and supportive of the needs of disabled people, or as Bryce points out: everyone.
- Supporting Civic Engagement in the Library: The Skokie Civic Lab Model, with Amy Koester. Skokie Public Library has been doing some exemplary work in this area, focusing on developmentally appropriate events, collections, and learning opportunities for all ages in their community. Again, some spectacular resources are available, so even if you can't set aside 90 minutes to review the webinar archive, you'll want to check out Amy's slides, handout, FAQ and so on.
- Finally, the <u>Readers' Advisory PLUS Unconference was a smash</u>. Huge thanks to Carina Gonzalez from the Somerset County Library System for compiling an excellent list of resources for all the cultural advisory work we do.
