The address label does not have particular person's name on but it indicates on one of the outside packing labels that NJLA is paying for it. Please check around your library's technical services department for it. All packages are delivered FedEx and the package can be tracked.

CSLP website

The PSAs available on the website can be freely used. They are more generic than in past years and can be used year-around. Check them out by going to the main page of the CSLP website (www.cslpreads.org) where it says "Check Out Our 2019 PSAs."

CSLP Teen Video Challenge 2019

The Collaborative Summer Reading Program (CSLP) will be sponsoring the Teen Video Challenge (TVC) for 2019 but this year it will be a little different.

First, what will remain the same:

- The TVC invites teens to create and submit a PSA-type video promoting reading and library use to other teens.
- Each video needs to include the teen/teen team's interpretation of the 2019 CSLP slogan, "A
 Universe of Stories," to correspond to the 2019 space theme.
- Videos need to adhere to copyright law and be appropriate for all ages.
- Each of the 5 winning teens/teen teams will receive a \$200 cash prize and the winners' local public libraries will each receive a \$50 gift certificate from Upstart.

Now, for the changes:

- Instead of state winners, there will be 5 national winners (this means that teens will submit videos directly to the national judging panel without having to go through me as the State Rep).
- The program will accept submissions June 1-Aug 2, 2019, so that the program can be incorporated into summer programs (it is still a great opportunity to partner with schools with video production classes or clubs; students can produce the videos as a class project and submit them in June!).
- Videos will be up to 60 seconds long.
- Permission and model release forms will not be required until the finalists are selected, who will
 then need to supply the forms, completed correctly, to be able to win. The only form required
 upfront will be a simple online submission form.
- The TVC Ad-Hoc Committee will convene a judging panel from CSLP partners and members.
- Video uploads will not be limited to YouTube and Vimeo; rather, teens can upload their creations to the social media outlet of their choice.

These changes were crafted to make the contest simpler for you as teen services staff in public librarians to promote and administer, and simpler too for teens to enter. We hope these changes will boost interest and participation in the contest and make it more accessible for all involved. An overview of the TVC is--for the first time!--in the CSLP Teen Manual (pages 33-35) as well. Look for more information on the CSLP website in early 2019.

Highlights & Action Items from March 19, 2019 Meeting at Mullica Hill

Reports within NJLA

- The switch to MemberClicks is moving along. The webpage section has gone to Karen Klapperstuck, James Keehbler, and Allen McGinley.
- Jessica T. offered to research Zoom Meeting and get more information.
- The Past President Scholarship is on schedule and the deadline will be in April. All details are online. New Business
- Member Communications Report Report Laverne M. makes a motion to approve editorship of the newsletter and the editorial board membership from the Member Communications Committee report. Jen S. seconds. All in favor. Old Business
- Bylaws Committee Report Emily M. makes a motion to accept. Amy B. seconds and thanks the committee. All in favor. This will go for vote at the membership meeting.
- Diversity Program Proposal presented by Emily M. Leah W. clarified that we will not be charging for the workshop, the past presidents raised \$2,500 and Pat T. has matched it.
- Nominations and Elections Michael M. presented an update. The slate is almost complete except for a 2nd Presidential Candidate. Membership will be informed of everyone who is running by the first week in April. Partnering organizations
- NJ State Library Report Mary C. is pleased with how the Library Construction Bond is going and should be out of the NJSL on April 1. Kathleen Peiffer is making timelines with administrative law for feedback and creating visual aides.
- Laverne M. is seeking more information from Bob Keith about the Local Library Support Fund checks. The State Library sent out the checks and the total combined from 2 years is \$11,000.00. Mary C. asks if NJLA would try and get an amendment passed to hold the money for more than a year and pass out the checks every few years or allow the State Library to use it for library services.
- NJASL The DOE has released the school performance report which includes school librarians. The ratio of students to SLMS is disturbing. NJASL is asking their membership to look at the school performance reports at their own districts to see if they are accurate.
- There are other issues besides job loss. One issue brought to light is substitute teaching. SLMS's are being asked to be substitute teachers leaving their own libraries to fend for themselves. This is a point of concern for many librarians.

● Joyce V. is meeting with high school librarians to create a study to prove that if students had an effective SLMS in high school they will perform better as freshman. The next meeting is at the Piscataway Public Library on Tuesday, April 16 at 4:30pm.
