- Books for Kids
 - Carol Simon Levin is no longer at SCLS
 - We cannot use statewide delivery anymore (it is only supposed to be used for specifically requested library materials)
 - Can we move forward with this program?
 - No longer have distributing libraries and each library deals with distribution themselves
 - Need a larger committee
 - Books were needed for Holiday distribution, so at this point we can't move forward, work needs to start in Sept/Oct. for holiday distribution
 - Committee is on Hiatus for now

- Public Policy (Dana Skwirut)
 - The Public Policy Committee met on January 12th at the Monroe Township Library. There is a new legislative sessions now that there is a new Governor, which means any bills not voted on in the previous session need to be reintroduced.
 - Two bills pertaining to school libraries have been reintroduced. NJ A1995 would require certain ratios of school library media specialist to students in public schools. Example: 250 students equals 1 part-time library, 500 students equals 1 Librarian and so on.
 - NJ A132 would require information literacy instruction in the curriculum of students in grades K-12.
